Welcome! In the name of our risen Savior we welcome you to Mt. Olive and thank you for worshipping with us. Explanation of the Week: "The day of the Lord so comes as a thief in the night" (1 Thess 5:1-11). The arrival of the bridegroom will be sudden and unexpected. Therefore you are to be watchful and ready like the five wise virgins. "For you know neither the day nor the hour in which the Son of Man is coming" (Matt 25:1-13). The lamps are the Word of Christ. The oil in the lamps is the Holy Spirit, who works through the Word to create and sustain the flame of faith in Christ. The foolish are those who do not give proper attention to the working of the Holy Spirit in baptism, preaching, and the supper, and so their faith does not endure. The wise, however, are those who diligently attend to these gifts of the Spirit, and who therefore have an abundance of oil. The flame of faith endures to the end. By God's grace they are received into the eternal wedding feast of the Lamb in His kingdom, the new heavens and the new earth created by the Lord for the joy of His people (Is 65:17-25).

Order of Service, Rite One (p. 41). This order of service, known as the "Bugenhagen Order," grew out of the Lutheran Reformation. It was provided for use in the churches of Denmark and Norway in 1537 by Johannes Bugenhagen, Martin Luther's pastor. Minor revisions were made to this service in 1685 and 1889 before it was translated into English for **The Lutheran Hymnary** (1913). The service printed here comes directly from the **Evangelical Lutheran Hymnary** (1996).

I. The Service of Preparation

P: O Lord, our Maker, Redeemer, and Comforter, we are assembled in Your presence to hear Your holy Word. We pray You to open our hearts by Your Holy Spirit, that through the preaching of Your Word we may be taught to repent of our sins, to believe on Jesus in life and death, and to grow day by day in grace and holiness. Hear us for Christ's sake. Amen.

~Confession of Sin − Admitting our sinfulness to God

(ELH p. 41, II)

P: Let us confess our sins to God and pray: We poor sinners confess to You, O God, not only that we have been conceived and born in sin, but also that throughout life we have often and in many ways offended You, our Lord and Maker, in thought, word and deed, so that You could with perfect justice reject and condemn us for all eternity. Therefore we come before You with sorrow of heart, in dread and terror of Your holy justice and of everlasting death. Our sins are a grievous foe, which we should hate in every way as long as we live. O merciful God, You still grant us in this hour to be reminded of Your fatherly goodness. According to the promise of Your Word we flee for refuge to Your infinite mercy, and implore You, dearest Father, for the sake of Jesus Christ, Your only-begotten Son, our Brother, who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised again for our justification: Forgive us all our sins through faith, which the Holy Spirit increases in our hearts to full assurance.

C: We therefore pray You, O Lord, through Your servant to declare to us the forgiveness of all our sins. We poor sinners are willing to forgive all who have offended against us. We earnestly desire to grow in true godliness. Help us, O God, for the sake of Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

II. The Service of the Word



(After receiving the forgiveness of sins, we thanked God by singing His praises and praying to Him. He now increases our faith through His holy Word which we hear through the Lessons and especially through the Sermon where God's Word is applied to our lives today.)

I Thessalonians 5:1-11 Concerning the times and dates, brothers, there is no need to write to you, for you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When people are saying, "Peace and security," destruction will suddenly come on them, like labor pains on a pregnant woman, and they will certainly not escape. But you, brothers, are not in the dark so that this day takes you by surprise like a thief, for you are all sons of the light and sons of the day. We do not belong to the night or the darkness. So then let us not sleep like everyone else, but rather let us remain alert and sober. To be sure, those who sleep, sleep at night, and those who get drunk, get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, putting on faith and love as a breastplate, and the hope of salvation as a helmet. You see, God did not appoint us for wrath, but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ. He died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep, we may live together with him. Therefore, encourage one another and build each other up, just as you are also doing.

Matthew 25:1-13 "At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish ones took their lamps, they did not take any oil with them; but the wise took oil in their containers with their lamps. While the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!' Then all those virgins got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil because our lamps are going out.' But the wise answered, 'No, there may not be enough for us and for you. Instead, go to those who sell oil and buy some for yourselves.' But while they were away buying oil, the bridegroom came. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding banquet, and the door was shut. Later, the other virgins also came and said, 'Lord, Lord, let us in.' But he answered, 'Amen I tell you: I do not know you.' Therefore, keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour.

~Sermon Text

Luke 18:9-14 Jesus told this parable to certain people who trusted in themselves (that they were righteous) and looked down on others: "Two men went up to the temple courts to pray. One was a Pharisee, and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee stood and prayed about himself like this: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, robbers, evildoers, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week. I give a tenth of all my income.' "However the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even lift his eyes up to heaven, but was beating his chest and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' "I tell you, this man went home justified rather than the other, because everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

Building Committee Updates

- 1. There are now four handicap parking spaces marked by the southwest corner of the school.
- 2. Due to demolition and construction activities, the cry room will be unusable until the new narthex is completed. In the interim, the fireside room is available to parents and children when privacy is desired; the changing table and supplies have been moved to the handicap bathroom across the hall from the kitchen. The fireside room is also available to mothers and young children between services while Sunday school and Bible study are in session. The Bible Information Class will be held in the school library during this time.
- 3. Sidewalks, curb and gutter work have begun as the weather allows and are scheduled to be completed soon. Weather permitting, the first lift of asphalt for the parking lot will be installed the week of Thanksgiving.
- 4. The next evidence of progress within the building program will be construction of a temporary wall at the back of the sanctuary. This wall will ensure the safety and integrity of that side of the sanctuary and will enable us to continue to use the sanctuary for the majority of the construction period. Demolition of the office spaces behind the temporary wall will begin shortly after its construction.
- 5. The temporary wall will require the removal of the chairs at the back of the sanctuary, but those chairs will be relocated to new positions throughout the sanctuary so that there will be no reduction in seating capacity.
- 6. Expect the next update early in December. Please continue to be patient with the inconveniences of construction and prayerful that all is done according to God's will for His congregation.

Seminarian David Choi + Sermon Text: Luke 18:9-14 + "Two Different Ways of Salvation"

Prayer: Dear Father in heaven, please teach us your will through this text today, and may the Holy Spirit working through us with your holy words, help us to be aware of our sin. Please forgive us our sins. And give us humble hearts before you; we ask it in Jesus' name. Amen.

Introduction: "Comparisons" are common in our life, although we don't always speak about it. But our nature likes to make comparisons, and we often compare ourselves with others.

Our old Adam is always trying to compare itself with others. I am a musician and very good at playing piano, but look at him--he make no sense of music at all. I am the professional football player and have experiences in many games. Our team is always beating the other team. But look at that team--everyone on that team plays like rookies. There is no fun watching that game. I am a well-educated man, having a Masters or PhD degree, while the others in my group looks so dumb--how can I bear them?

We naturally build our own self-worth on comparisons with others' weakness and try to satisfy our own conscience and enjoy it very much. The text today shows us two men in the temple praying to God. The Pharisee in the parable compared himself with the tax collector who knows he is a sinner before God. The Pharisee was confident about his own righteousness and prayed proudly, but the tax collector felt like he committed horrible sins every day and sincerely repented of his sin. In this parable, Jesus shows us two different ways of salvation, One man relied on himself for salvation, and the other relied on his God for salvation.

1. The Pharisee's Way of Salvation

In the human eyes, the life-style of the Pharisee was very successful. He considered the Jewish religion tradition very seriously. He kept on praying to the Lord, fasting every day and was willing to offer one tenth of his income for serving others. People respected the Pharisee so much that he himself believed that he was righteous in front of God. He had such a strong belief about his own merit that he had no doubt that through all his good works and efforts, he could earn merit and could boast in front of God! "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: swindlers, unjust, adulterers...." You can tell through his prayer how prideful his heart was. He was actually not praying to God, but praying and worshiping himself, enjoying the good feeling comparing himself with others and said to himself "Hey, you are a nice and decent guy, fasting twice a week, paying tithes regularly"

Not only just this Pharisee pretended to be so decent and pious. Actually the Old Adam in us also enjoys worshiping ourselves too. We also enjoy others' praise and nice words. We also like pursuing a good reputation from others and crediting it to ourselves. We like to tell others how good our life is. Our old Adam likes saying," You are a such nice person and always are doing so many good things, helping others with your offerings all the time, and never committing sin."

I never commit the sins that other people do. People believe these illusory feeling about themselves and start to worship themselves. Furthermore, in the same way many other religions and cultures around us are always trying to draw us away from the Trinity God, either worship ourselves or other idols like some historical and religion figures and worldly things like money, reputation, achievement etc.

The Pharisee in this parable of Jesus believed that he could obey the law and obtain his own salvation. He believed his good works made him righteous before God, always fasting, offering his wealth. He assumed that doing all these things would make him decent and righteous. These ideas of this Pharisee are still very popular among modern day churches. Many churches' teaching emphasizes how many times you have to pray every day, how much money you should donate to your church, and how often you should go to the church services; otherwise, you can't earn the salvation and God will be angry with you. Well, I don't mean good works are bad, but we should check ourselves why we should do the good works. Is it to save ourselves or to thank God that we have already been saved?

This idea of work righteousness is found not only in Christian churches but also in all non-Christian churches. All pagan churches teach that man must save himself. Only true Christianity teaches that Christ did everything for our salvation, and we don't have to do anything.

The result of this work righteousness is that we have pride in own hearts and only believe in our own merit. This leads us to compare our "good works" with others, and we start to despise others in our hearts thinking "God, I thank you that I am not like other people--swindlers, unjust, adulterers, even like this tax-gatherer....". Like the Pharisee in the text, we can start believing our own goodness and have confidence in our own merit, always comment on other people's works and their qualities, and make ourselves prideful and arrogant. The result of the working righteousness minds will be self-righteousness.

Is that really possible for a man through his good works and his merit to earn salvation and make himself righteous before God? The Scriptures tell us this is impossible! In Romans 3:10 it is written "There is no one righteous, not even one"; "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). The law demands

complete perfection. But the fact is we daily commit sin so much that we should deserve nothing but punishment in God's standard, the punishment in hell.

2. The Tax Collector's Way of Salvation

Is there any hope for us? Yes it is the same hope as that of the tax collector; he trusted in his God. He trusted in the promised Savior who would live an holy life for us and die on the cross to pay for all human sin. When the Holy Spirit through God's words and His sacraments comes to sinners, we will recognize our sin and will realize our sinful nature, and then understand that our corrupted human flesh deserves nothing but punishment. We as sinful human beings can do nothing for our salvation. We can only look to the True Savior's help to rescue us from these terrible sins.

The tax collector in the text realized these facts. So he was standing some distance away from the sanctuary, and he was even unwilling to lift up his eyes to heaven when he was praying to God. And at the same time he beats his breast saying "God, be merciful to me , the sinner!" which was in sharp contrast with the Pharisee on the other side. The tax collector was praying with a repentant and sincere heart , and acted very humble and inferior way in front of God, confessed his sin and looked for God' help.

Like the tax collector in this story, for the believers in nowadays' church, the Holy Spirit came to us through the Word and sacraments, and He is working inside of our believers' hearts. As the results of His work, we definitely will recognize our sin and repent before the Lord, our merciful Father. We will also look for the Savior's promise to rescue us from our sin and all the temptations from evil ones.

According to the text, even though we see ourselves are good, God is the real judge and will judge us based on His perfect standard which we will never live up to. We as poor sinners actually have nothing to boast about in front of Him because He knows all our sin-- nothing can be hidden by us. That is why our Savior Jesus Christ came to us for helping the sinners. "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners." (Matthew 9:12).

Through Jesus' holy life and holy death, He obtained the salvation for all. He was punished on the cross for our sin, died and buried instead of us, so that we can be justified and declared righteous in God's eyes through faith in His only Son, in the same way the tax- collector was justified by Jesus, which was proved by Jesus in the text "I tell you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other."

Not only we are declared righteousness by God the moment when we come to faith in Jesus Christ, but also at the same time, we became God's adopted sons, and God the Father gives us the Sonship because of faith in Jesus Christ. Because of this truth,

we can boldly call the Almighty God "Abba Father". What a priority we got from our Father in heaven through faith in his son Jesus Christ!

Conclusion: We became righteous not because of our works or our effort for obeying the law, but God proclaimed we are righteousness through faith in Jesus Christ. That is why we have nothing to boast about in front of God and others. The Pharisee's way of salvation is leading into death and condemnation, but the tax collector's way of salvation is to repent and trust in God with all our heart and mind, which will lead us into the true salvation, "Jesus Christ". Therefore, as we enter into this amazing grace, like the hymn teaches us, may the words from our mouths always be "Lord have mercy upon us, Christ have mercy upon us! Lord have mercy upon me!"
